HAPPENINGS ON THE HILL

I start this month's update with a quick recap of a successful online seminar hosted by EPA on January 25th, only days after the NAICC annual meeting. During this event, NAICC members Matt Eich, Ian Olson, Hank Jones, Matt Winslow, James Todd, and Steve Hoffman (along with Allison and myself) shared with over two hundred participants from EPA, USDA, FWS and State Departments of Agricultures, NAICC's perspective on how EPA's proposed ESA mitigations might work on the ground. More importantly, through this dialogue the audience gained a deeper understanding of the respective consultant's roles in advising producers on the selection and implementation of conservation practices and drift reduction strategies.

This successful engagement was the result of conversations a couple of months ago between Hank Jones and EPA's Kelly Tindall. It is a clear reminder that strategically placed conversations and follow-ups can pay big dividends as we seek to build deeper relationships among Federal and State agencies on the critical issues surrounding ESA mitigations.

Hill News

This week, tensions within the House Committee on Agriculture on finding additional dollars for the next farm bill's priorities spilled into public view in the form of dueling op-eds. See <u>here</u> and <u>here</u>. While hard farm bill negotiations always occur out of public view, this week's activity was a reminder that fence lines are being set publicly. In the view of some, Chairman Thompson's staff has charted a compelling path for additional dollars. But Ranking Member Scott's reply clearly shows that the gap between compelling and convincing is wide enough to drive a Mack truck through.

Also, on Wednesday, February 14th, at 10:00 am EST, the House Committee will host Secretary Vilsack at its annual "State of Agriculture" hearing. You can listen to it <u>here</u>. With twenty-eight Republicans and twenty-four Democrats around the dais, you can expect a long hearing, and pointed questions.

Regulatory update

Regulatory matters in February are, so far, framed by two issues. The first was EPA's February 7th announcement of the next steps in its ESA/FIFRA strategies; more <u>here</u>. The announcement was in line with expectations arising

from ongoing conversations with EPA. The concept of offsets, however, has limited understanding within the ESA/FIFRA nexus, so it is likely to generate questions.

Later this month, on February 26, I will be representing NAICC at an invitationonly meeting, to hear updates from EPA, USDA, USFWS, NMFS, and CEQ on their progress on ESA-FIFRA work and to hear input from interested parties such as NAICC on whether efforts to provide growers with adequate mitigation options, refining endangered species maps that inform pesticide restrictions, and recognition of existing conservation practices that reduce pesticide drift and runoff are workable.

The second critical February issue was the decision by an Arizona Federal Court on the sixth to vacate, on procedural grounds, EPA's 2020 registration decision that allowed over-the-top applications of three dicamba products, XtendiMax, Engenia and Tavium.

EPA has until April 8 to notice an appeal or leave the court's ruling in place. Until EPA acts, it is unclear what this decision means although EPA will view these products as unregistered unless it appeals the ruling.

Whether EPA appeals or not, it will need to give direction to manufacturers, retailers, applicators, and growers on how to manage existing stocks. That is why within 24 hrs. of the court decision, end users were urgently calling on EPA to use its FIFRA authority to quickly issue a flexible and inclusive order on use of existing stocks during the next growing season.
